**History**

Baltimore merchant Johns Hopkins died on Christmas Eve 1873, leaving \$7 million to be divided between a university and a hospital that would bear his name. Today, these interconnected institutions remain among the world's great resources for higher education, research, patient care and public service. The Johns Hopkins University opened in 1876 as America's first research university, founded for the express purpose of expanding knowledge and putting that knowledge to work for the good of humanity.

**Campuses**

The Homewood campus, including schools of Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Business, and Education, rests on 140 acres in northern Baltimore. Other Baltimore area campuses include the schools of Medicine, Nursing and Public Health in east Baltimore and the Peabody Institute in historic Mt. Vernon. The School of Advanced International Studies is located in Washington, D.C.. The Applied Physics Laboratory for research is located between Baltimore and Washington. The 36-acre Montgomery County campus offers more than 60 part-time degree programs.
